A. MOTION TO APPROVE the FY 24 Strategic Plan

The TPA's Strategic Plan identifies specific actions the TPA aims to achieve in the upcoming year. The Strategic Plan is annually reviewed by the TPA's Executive Committee and revised for the upcoming fiscal year. TPA staff will highlight FY 23 activities and review proposed changes in the draft FY 24 Strategic Plan attached.

TAC/CAC/VZAC: Recommended adoption unanimously.

B. MOTION TO ADOPT the Fiscal Year (FY) 25-29 List of Priority Projects (LOPP)

The LOPP guides development of the Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) Five-Year Work Program and the TPA's Transportation Improvement Program (TIP). Florida Statutes require the TPA to annually adopt and transmit the LOPP to FDOT. The TPA and FDOT have mutually agreed to a deadline of August 1. The list of projects is consistent with the TPA's adopted Long Range Transportation Plan (LRTP) and its associated goals, objectives, and targets.

The draft FY 25-29 LOPP is organized into State Road Modifications, Local Initiatives Projects, and Transportation Alternative Projects. The list identifies the additional funding needs of those projects previously approved by the TPA and requests funding for several new projects. The draft FY 25-29 LOPP is attached.

TAC: Recommended adoption 20-2, with dissention from the West Palm Beach

Representatives due to inclusion of SR 7.

CAC: Recommended adoption 14-2.

VZAC: Recommended adoption 17-2 with dissention from the West Palm Beach Representative due to inclusion of SR 7, and Disabled Community due to the inclusion of shared use pathways that may not adequately address conflicts between pedestrians and bicyclists.

1.E. Special Presentation- Dump the Pump Proclamation

COMMISSIONER FOX announced the City of West Palm Beach was awarded a federal grant for a rail safety study for pedestrian bridges along the Florida East Coast Railway (FEC) and mentioned the City's new shuttle service.

VICE MAYOR SACHS invited board members to attend a transportation workshop on June 21.

MAYOR WEISS stated he planned to attend Brightline's End of Construction event in Orlando on June 21.

Andrew noted the TIP is the TPA's five-year funding program for transportation projects in Palm Beach County. The amendment request was for SR-5/US-1 over the Earman River Bridge (FM# 44428911) to add funding to cover additional scoping needs and recent increases in unit prices.

2.B ADOPTED: a Resolution Approving the TPA's FY 24-28 TIP

ANDREW UHLIR, TPA Deputy Director of Programs, noted the FY 24-28 TIP was developed in collaboration with FDOT and various local agencies, and included transportation projects funded by federal, state, and local sources for all modes of transportation. The TIP reflects revenue expectations for the next five fiscal years and shows phases and funding sources by year for each project.

3. INFORMATION ITEMS

3.A. <u>DISCUSSED</u>: South Florida Commuter Rail Update

PHIL SCHWAB, Broward County Consultant for FDOT District 4, provided an update on the commuter rail project proposed along the FEC.

LISA COLMENARES, Chief Planning Officer of the Transportation Planning and Policy Division at the Miami-Dade County Department of Transportation and Public Works (M-DC DPTW), provided an update on commuter rail along the FEC. She also introduced Gabriella Serrado, Chief of Infrastructure Planning and Systems Development at M-DC DPTW.

There were no public comments on this item.

VALERIE NEILSON asked Mr. Schwab to clarify why Miami-Dade and Broward Counties have the ability to apply for federal discretionary grants to fund enhanced transit.

CHAIR REED asked Mr. Schwab to clarify acronyms.

MAYOR WEISS asked about subsidies for Tri-Rail, ridership shifting between Tri-Rail and Brightline, and inquired on the status of the New River Bridge Train Crossing.

AMANDA CHRISTON, Broward MPO Transit Manager, provided clarification on Broward Commuter Rail.

MAYOR KURETSKI requested commuter rail ridership heat map of ridership for each station.

COUNCIL MEMBER DRUCKER inquired about the ownership of stations in Hollywood and Fort Lauderdale.

COMMISSIONER MARINO inquired on the costs for Miami-Dade County and whether the FEC will allow trains to operate as well as the cost to operate from Mangonia Park to Jupiter in Palm Beach County.

LISA COLMENARES explained the FEC Access Fee is still in discussion; however, they are able to proceed with pursuing grants for service in the FEC right-of-way.

VICE MAYOR SACHS asked whether a dedicated funding source is required for to apply for federal transit grants and whether the match is possible without a transportation tax.

LISA COLMENARES replied a match is required for federal grants.

CLINTON FORBES, Palm Tran Executive Director, clarified the most common approach for a match to federal grants to fund enhanced transit service is through a surtax or an ad valorem tax. He also summarized the implementation of the surtax in Miami-Dade County.

COMMISSIONER FOX asked when Miami-Dade County residents felt it was necessary to pass a

transportation surtax and how to encourage residents when the timeline can take 10 to 20 years.

CLINTON FORBES summarized the "pain point" for Miami-Dade County, groundswell support, and timing.

COMMISSIONER WOODWARD asked about the interconnectivity of transportation technology applications between different modes of transportation across the counties.

PAUL GOUGELMAN, TPA General Council, inquired on who led the surtax campaign in Miami-Dade County and how it was funded.

Commissioner Bernard left the meeting at 9:49am.

Vice Mayor Cruz left the meeting at 9:59am.

Vice Mayor Brinkman left the meeting at 10:03am.

Mayor Weiss and Commissioner Peduzzi left the meeting at 10:15am.

A RESOLUTION APPROVING THE FISCAL YEAR (FY) 2025-2029 LIST OF PRIORITY PROJECTS

WHEREAS, the Palm Beach Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO) doing business as the Palm Beach Transportation Planning Agency (TPA), created in accordance with and operating pursuant to 23 U.S.C. §134, 49 U.S.C. §5303-5305, and §163.01 and §339.175, Florida Statutes ("F.S."), is the designated and duly constituted body responsible for the metropolitan transportation planning process for Palm Beach County; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to §339.175(8), F.S., the TPA is responsible for developing, annually, a list of priority projects and submitting the list to District 4 of the Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) by August 1 of each year for; and

WHEREAS, the list of priority projects serves as the TPA's priorities for the upcoming creation of FDOT's Draft Work Program, and ultimately, the TPA's Transportation Improvement Program; and

WHEREAS, the FY 25-29 List of Priority Projects is based upon project selection criteria that consider the TPA's adopted Long Range Transportation Plan, the Strategic Intermodal System plan, the Transportation Regional Incentive Program (TRIP) priorities, the results of the TPA's transportation management system, and the TPA's public involvement procedures; and

WHEREAS, the FY 25-29 List of Priority Projects has been formally reviewed and recommended for approval by the TPA's advisory committees.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE PALM BEACH MPO, d/b/a PALM BEACH TRANSPORTATION PLANNING AGENCY, THAT:

SECTION 1. The foregoing recitals are hereby adopted and declared to be true and correct and are incorporated herein.

SECTION 2. The TPA Governing Board hereby:

a. Approves the FY 25-29 List of Priority Projects, attached hereto as "Exhibit A" and by this reference incorporated herein; and

b. Authorizes the TPA Executive Director to submit the FY 25-29 List of Priority Projects to FDOT District 4.



Overview

The Palm Beach Transportation Planning Agency (TPA) Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) for Fiscal Years 2025 through 2029 begins with TPA Board approval of a List of Priority Projects (LOPP). Pursuant to s. 339.175(8), F.S., the TPA must transmit the project list to the Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) by August 1 of each year to accommodate an accelerated Florida Legislative session schedule. FDOT uses the List of Priority Projects to develop their Five-Year Work Program and the TPA uses the list to develop the TIP.

Existing Priority Projects that have not yet been implemented continue to be shown on the project list. If the lead agency for a Priority Project cannot complete the programmed phase and advance the project to the next logical phase, it is incumbent upon the agency to provide an explanation to the Palm Beach TPA. Changes to the priority list from the previously adopted priority list are underlined in the following tables.

The Priority Projects are divided into three programs: State Road Modifications, Local Initiatives, and Transportation Alternatives. These programs are consistent with the TPA's adopted Long Range Transportation Plan (LRTP) and the funding sources assumed in the financial plan of the LRTP. The TPA Board also adopted Resolution TPA 2015-04 on June 18, 2015 to further clarify the funding expectations for implementation of TPA Priority Projects as summarized below. The resolution noted that Strategic Intermodal System (SIS) Projects identified by FDOT are to be funded primarily with SIS revenue, other minor projects (e.g. local projects, FDOT safety projects, etc.) are to be funded with discretionary resources, and the implementation of these projects shall create no adverse impacts on implementation of TPA Priority Projects.

- <u>Major Projects/State Road Modifications</u> are to be funded with a portion of District Dedicated Revenue (DDR) Funds, DS Funds and State Public Transportation Office (DPTO) Funds. The portion of funding available for Major Projects is expected to be the remaining revenue from these sources after satisfying operations and maintenance requirements, district-managed SIS commitments, and statutory obligations to other modes of transportation.
- <u>Local Initiative Projects</u> are to be funded with the TPA's sub-allocated share of Surface Transportation Program funds (SU) and supplemented with statewide Surface Transportation Program funds (SA) where possible. Some SU and/or SA funds may occasionally be used for State Road Modification projects when state revenues are inadequate to fully fund those projects.
- <u>Transportation Alternative Projects</u> are to be funded with the federal Transportation Alternative (TA) revenue.

The projects in each program are consistent with the Goals, Objectives, and Measures of the LRTP. Eligible projects were evaluated and ranked pursuant to the LRTP and the scoring systems for the individual programs, as applicable. Projects are ordered by the year the project was first prioritized followed by the prioritization in that specific year. For example, 20-1 indicates the year 2020 and the top ranking (first) priority project from 2020.

The TPA prepared the following LOPP that is multimodal in nature and provides overall direction to FDOT in allocating funds. The public involvement process includes presentation and discussion of the project list at meetings open to the public; agendas for these meetings are posted on the TPA website. The LOPP will be reviewed by the Technical Advisory Committee (July 5, 2023), Vision Zero Advisory Committee (July 6, 2023), and Citizen Advisory Committee (July 11, 2023). The TPA Governing Board is expected to adopt the Annual LOPP at the July 20, 2023, meeting.

Major Projects

Project Selection Process

Larger projects are selected from line-item Cost Feasible projects in the adopted 2045 Long Range Transportation Plan (LRTP). Smaller non-regionally significant projects are identified by TPA staff and stakeholder groups and include State Road Modifications that advance the TPA's vision, Complete Streets policy, and Vision Zero commitment. Projects incorporate safety, complete streets, infrastructure to construct enhanced transit corridors, transportation system management & operations, and environmental resiliency. When possible, this program provides supplemental funding for resurfacing and bridge replacement/rehab projects to advance the objectives noted above. The TPA did a call for projects for State Road Modifications in 2023.

Project Funding

Major Projects and the State Road Modifications are funded with a portion of:

- State Comprehensive Enhanced Transportation System (SCETS) funds, identified using the District Dedicated Revenue (DDR) fund code, to be expended within Palm Beach County pursuant to s. 206.608(2), F.S.;
- State fuel sales tax funds, including State Primary funds for highways and public transit (DS fund code) and State Public Transportation Office funds (DPTO fund code) to be expended for any legitimate state transportation purpose, with a required minimum for public transportation;
- Highway Safety Improvement Program (HSIP or SS fund codes) funds on identified safety projects; and
- Federal Surface Transportation Program Funds (SU and/or SA fund codes) when state revenues are inadequate to fully fund projects.

Funding available for State Road Modifications is expected to be the remaining revenue from these sources after satisfying operations and maintenance requirements, district-managed SIS commitments, and statutory obligations to other modes of transportation. Projects that are new to the list are typically programmed in the new 5th year – Fiscal Year 2029. Recent increases in costs and limited state funding has increased the amount of SU funding on Major Projects/State Road Modifications that is typically prioritized for the Local Initiatives priorities.

Anticipated 5-YR Funding from LRTP (State Funds Only): ~\$101M (\$20.4M/yr.)

Programmed Funding in Adopted FY 24-28 TIP (State Funds Only): ~\$41.8M (additional \$100.8M from other federal sources)

Amount needed to fund all phases of remaining priorities: ~\$389.5M

The TPA requests the following for the FY 25-29 Major Projects/State Road Modifications List:

- **Program state funding instead of SU funding when available** reduce the amount of SU funding programmed towards state roadway projects to program Local Initiatives priorities.
- SR-7 from 60th St to Northlake Blvd (#04-1) and SR-7 from Okeechobee Blvd to 60th St (#04-2): fully fund construction, prioritizing state funding if available.
- Tri-Rail extension from West Palm Beach to Jupiter (#14-1): the Project Development & Environment (PD&E) Study cannot occur until an FEC easement/ access fee and source of operations and maintenance funding is established. The TPA requests a feasibility study of the proposed extension.
- Atlantic Avenue from east of Lyons Road to Florida's Turnpike (#16-1a): FDOT is considering the advancement of construction to FY 24 to occur with Atlantic Ave from SR-7 to east of Lyons Rd (#14-3). The TPA supports this advancement.
- US-1 enhanced transit service with associated multimodal corridor facilities: The TPA requests:
 - Construction funding for the lane repurposing project in Boca Raton (#17-1c);
 - Construction funding for complete streets reconstruction project in West Palm Beach (17-1d);
 - Design funding for lane repurposing project in Lake Worth Beach (priority #17-1g), pending FDOT approval of design.
- Okeechobee Blvd enhanced transit service with associated multimodal corridor facilities: The TPA requests:
 - Construction funding for enhanced transit shelters (#18-1b)
- Lake Worth Rd enhanced transit service with associated multimodal corridor facilities (20-1): The TPA requests funding of transit signal prioritization to coincide with the transit signal prioritization on US 1 and Okeechobee Blvd.
- Federal Hwy at Spanish River Blvd (#20-1): The TPA requests construction funding.
- Traffic Signal Improvements: The TPA requests construction funding for traffic signal upgrades and supporting infrastructure for Palm Beach County and City of Boca Raton signals, including priority projects 20-2, 20-3, and 20-4.
- SR-715 sidewalk construction (#20-5): The TPA requests construction funding.
- Indiantown Rd at Central Blvd PD&E (#21-6): The TPA requests funding of the PD&E to evaluate congestion mitigation alternatives.
- New 2023 priorities #23-1, #23-2, and #23-3: The TPA requests FDOT consider programming preliminary engineering (PE).

Local Initiatives Projects

Project Selection Process

The Local Initiatives Program was created in the 2040 LRTP and is structured to identify and fund non-regionally significant transportation projects off the state highway system. Local Initiative projects are selected from an annual competitive application process based on the Goals, Objectives, and Measures in the adopted LRTP; these projects are then approved by the advisory committees and the TPA Board. Applications for Local Initiative projects were solicited from transportation service providers, county, and municipal staff. The project scores and subsequent ranking for the 2023 application cycle are attached as Exhibit A.

Project Funding

These projects are primarily funded through federal Surface Transportation Program Funds, locally known as SU funds, sub-allocated to the Palm Beach TPA. The TPA receives approximately \$22.8 million per year. Approximately \$2.5 million is programmed towards TPA planning activities. Projects new to the list are typically programmed in the new 5th year – Fiscal Year 2029.

Anticipated 5-YR Funding from LRTP available for projects: ~\$114M (\$22.8 M/yr.) – may also be used on Major Projects/State Road priorities

Programmed Funding in Adopted FY 24-28 TIP (Federal Funds Only): ~\$74M (additional \$6.7 million of state funding

Amount needed to fund all phases of remaining priorities: ~\$42.12M

The TPA requests the following for the FY 24-29 Local Initiative Priority Project List:

- Update programming of SU funding to support TPA planning and administration consistent with the FY 23-24 UPWP.
- Quiet Zones in Lake Park (#14-5): Program \$517k for additional railroad safety improvements in Lake Park to allow for Quiet Zone designation.
- #20-1 Palm Tran electric buses: pursue advancement of \$5 M to an earlier year.
- 2022 Local Initiatives Priorities: Program remaining unprogrammed priorities from the 2022 call for projects if funding is available.
 - o #22-1 SW 18th St (now shown as TA project #22-5): move to Transportation Alternatives list to potentially fund in FY 26.
 - o #22-3 Gardens Parkway: pursue programming of \$3.6 M in FY 27 with funding freed up from #20-1.
 - o Program #22-4 through #22-7 if funding is available.
- 2023 Local Initiatives Priorities: Program new 2023 priorities from the 2023 call for projects if funding is available.

Transportation Alternatives Projects

Project Selection Process

Transportation Alternatives (TA) projects are selected from an annual competitive application process based on the Goals, Objectives, and Measures in the adopted LRTP; these projects are then ranked by the Vision Zero Advisory Committee (VZAC) and approved by the TPA Governing Board. The VZAC ranking and project scores for the 2023 application cycle are attached as Exhibit A.

Project Funding

Construction of TA Projects proposed for inclusion in the TIP is funded with federal Surface Transportation Block Grant (STBG) Transportation Alternative (TA) set-aside funds on a cost reimbursement basis for eligible expenses and supplemented with local funds. Funding levels are anticipated at \$5.1M/yr. Design of the project is funded by the applicant no less than two years prior to construction funding availability. Projects that are new to the list are typically programmed in the 3rd year – Fiscal Year 2027.

Anticipated 3-Year Funding Level from LRTP: ~\$15.3M (\$5.1M/yr.)

Programmed Funding in Adopted FY 24-28 TIP (Federal Funds Only): ~\$10.3M (additional funds to reach \$15.3M level is available for programming)

Amount needed to fund all phases of remaining priorities: ~\$5.62M

The TPA requests the following for the FY 24-28 Transportation Alternatives Priority Project List:

- #22-5 SW 18th St (previously shown as LI project #22-1): move to TA list to potentially fund in FY 26.
- Program construction/implementation of five (5) new 2023 projects from 2023 TA application cycle.

Table 1: Major Projects

Projects are predominantly on state roadways using state funding sources, including but not limited to District Dedicated Revenue (DDR) and Primary Highways & Public Transportation Funds (DS).

Projected funding availability is anticipated to be approximately \$20.4 Million/year but varies yearly. FDOT requests the TPA "oversubscribe" to ensure programming of all available funds.





| Initial Engineering | 30% plans to reviewers. Stakeholders provide review and feedback on the approved Typical Section. |
| Public Information Workshop | Tentative date to conduct a public information workshop. Date may differ than final workshop date. |
| Constructability Plans | 60% plans to reviewers. At this time most of the Design is complete, no scope discussion, review focuses on items to be constructed, their construction impacts, and materials to be used. |
| Plans Specification and Estimates (PSE) Meeting | FDOT PM arranges field review with all reviewers to evaluate the final engineering plans with respect to actual field conditions. |
| Biddability Plans to Reviewers | 90% plans. At this time, Design is complete. Verifying quantities and pay items. |
| Production | 100% plans. Plans are complete. |
| Local Agency Program (LAP) Commitment | Agency and FDOT commits the project funds and budget to the Legislature and the Governor's office. |
| Letting | Bids are opened and the apparent low bid contract is determined. Construction typically begins 4 to 6 months after letting. |
| Construction Notice to Proceed (NTP) | Construction starts. Construction dates for FDOT administered projects can be found through the FDOT Operations Center. |
