







What is Vision Zero?

Vision Zero is a state, national and international movement challenging us to eliminate all traffic-related fatalities and serious injuries. It relies on the expertise of engineers, public health professionals, law enforcement, first responders, roadway users and policymakers. Together, they look at safety as an interconnected system in which roadway designs, speed limits, human behavior, technology and policy can work together to make the system safer for everyone.

How does the Palm Beach TPA plan to accomplish Vision Zero?

By aligning with state and national safety initiatives like the State of Florida Highway Safety Plan and the TPA's own Transportation Improvement Program (five-year work plan), we can extend the ripple effects of our action plan far beyond our county's borders. The TPA also considers "complete streets to be an important component of accomplishing Vision Zero, with its [Complete Streets Policy](#) and Complete Streets Guidelines.

How big of a problem is this in Palm Beach County?

Palm Beach County is one of the most dangerous places in the entire country for bicyclists and pedestrians. In fact, Florida has the highest pedestrian danger in the entire country according to Smart Growth America, with nearly 5,900 pedestrian fatalities from 2010 – 2019. In Palm Beach County, there were 213 people killed on our roadways in 2021 (59 of which were bicyclists and pedestrians) and 893 serious injuries (132 of which were bicyclists and pedestrians).

Why is this important now?

The number of traffic fatalities in Palm Beach County are increasing. With more than 2,000 square miles and a population rapidly approaching 1.5 million people, the county is seeing tremendous growth. This means more drivers on the roadways and more people walking and biking. Nearly 25% of our residents are 65 and older, making them more vulnerable to traffic-related death or injury. Without action, these numbers will continue to increase each year.

What is the TPA doing to reduce these numbers, ultimately to zero?

The TPA has created a Vision Zero Action Plan, outlining what it will take to make our roadways safer. This includes identifying Palm Beach County's High Injury Network and determining where crashes are happening the most, adopting a Complete Streets policy and Design Guidelines, completing Walk Bike Audits, identifying upcoming projects to prioritize safety improvements and sharing funding opportunities with our partners.

What can drivers do to help?

Slow down and eliminate distractions. Speed is a major factor in crash severity and can ultimately determine crash survivability. If you are out when it's dark, make yourself visible. This includes reflective clothing when walking or lights when bicycling. Wear your seatbelt, never text while driving and never get behind the wheel after drinking or taking controlled substances.

What can I do to improve safety in my neighborhood?

Initiative sets a goal of zero traffic-related deaths and serious injuries

What is Vision Zero?

Vision Zero is a safety initiative to eliminate all traffic fatalities and severe injuries, while increasing safe, healthy, equitable mobility for all. First implemented in Sweden in the 1990s, Vision Zero has proved successful across Europe — and now it's gaining momentum or is the official policy goal of many South Florida Communities including the (amend as necessary) City of West Palm Beach, City of Delray Beach, City of Wellington, and others.

Communities are adopting a goal of zero fatalities or serious injuries because these are the most life altering for our communities, and because every one of these crashes involves someone in our community.

Why is Vision Zero important?

Each year, more than 42,000 people — the population of a small city — are needlessly killed on American streets and thousands more are injured. We call this suffering traffic “accidents” — but, in reality, we have the power to prevent traffic collisions.

What are the next steps?
